Last month, I outlined the successes of the CEP's inaugural five-year plan, Moving Forward. In fact, this plan was reached a full year early. This month's column will be focused on outlining

the recently adopted Moving Forward-Phase II plan which seeks to continue to grow and diversify the local economy. Moving Forward-Phase II

Just like its predecessor, this plan did not just happen. It is the result of months of discussion and research by the CEP staff and Board of Directors. Once again, the Board asked economist Dr. Sharon Younger to assist them in the creation of this plan. She provided an incredible layer of analysis and detail to assist the Board including a significant amount of data on how the Ocala MSA and the CEP compare to our ten benchmark communities.

First, it is important to note what this plan does not change. The CEP's mission has not changed. The organization continues to exist to be the catalyst for a more prosperous community by serving as the voice of the business community and working to create and retain jobs and provide a positive return on investment for our partners. Additionally, the approach remains the same. The CEP will continue to focus on Business Advocacy, Business Attraction, Business

Creation, Business Retention, and Business Services.

The Moving Forward-Phase II plans call for the CEP to do more in each area. The following is a highlight of some of the new initiatives or efforts planned to begin implementing over the next five years. In Business Advocacy, the plan calls for the CEP to add an additional team member to grow the opportunities to partner with local and state governments. The plan for Business Creation includes adding a business incubator location in addition to the main Power Plant Business Incubator campus and to create a major business plan competition. This competition would attract would-be entrepreneur from throughout the nation to compete for a significant cash prize (\$25,000 is the goal) and residency in the Power Plant. Business Services would see a continued increase in education and networking opportunities through the addition of at least two satellite locations allowing the CEP to better serve all of our community. Business Attraction would be impacted by the addition of a second project manager which would allow our equine engagement director to focus exclusively on how vibrant horse community.

However, Business Retention would see the growth of the most significant new emphasis. More than a third of the new plan is dedicated to implementing a plan for increasing Skills Development and Talent Attraction. Marion County Schools have taken a significant step forward with the realignment of skills-based training and the

announced creation of the two new Career Choice Academies with the promise of additional academies in the future. Skills Development would work to build connections between the schools and business community and work with all of our education partners on the creation of seamless career ladders. Talent Attraction will work much like Business Attraction but instead of focusing on attracting businesses it will focus on attracting skilled and talented people.

Just as the original Moving Forward plan resulted in the meeting and exceeding of

three big goals, the Phase II plan is an effort to meet three even larger goals. By the end of 2021, the CEP will 1) impact the announced creation of 4,500 new jobs. These jobs will 2) pay on average 15% above the current County average wage. These projects will result in 3) a direct capital investment of \$400 million. This plan and the meeting of these will continue to diversify and expand our local economy for the benefit of our residents, our businesses and our governments. However, it will only be accomplished if we all partner to keep Ocala and Marion County Moving Forward.



Florida's "stand your ground" law, could soon provide even more protection to people who invoke it. Senate Bill 128 protects the right of Floridians by correcting a

This bill is not a novel concept. We have a tradition in our criminal justice system that the burden of proof is with the government from the beginning of the case to the end.

The Senate passed legislation to clarify this critical constitutional issue last year, and I am pleased to see Senator Bradley's bill advance again this year. If the State of Florida is going to accuse a citizen of committing a crime, the State of Florida should have the burden of proof at each and every part of the proceeding to prove guilt beyond the exclusion of every reasonable doubt.

This is a fundamental American right guaranteed by our Constitution. A defendant always has the presumption of innocence and the state always has a burden of proof. We have an obligation to zealously guard the protections granted us all in the Constitution.

misinterpretation of the "Stand Your Ground" law in the 2015 Bretherick vs. State Florida Supreme Court decision.

Florida has been a leader in giving citizens immunity in cases of self-defense. While at least 22 states have similar laws that say, people can use force — even deadly force — to defend themselves from threats, Florida could soon be alone shifting the burden of proof to prosecutors.

School Resource Officer Battered Post Job Growth Over the Month and Year

Marion County, Florida (March 24, 2017) – On Thursday, March 23, 2017, a Marion County Sheriff's Office School Resource Deputy at Forest High School was made aware of several individuals that had entered the campus without signing in. Kasey Kohlmaier (DOB: 06/17/1997), Thomas Arthur Smith (DOB: 01/7/1998) and a 14-year old juvenile are not students at Forest High School and they were confronted by school administrators when they were seen in the school courtyard. The three subjects then fled to their car that was parked in the student parking lot. School Resource Deputy James Long pulled his agency assigned vehicle in front of the suspects' vehicle to prevent them from leaving the campus. Kohlmaier, a passenger of the vehicle, then fled on foot but was quickly apprehended by Deputy Long and two school administrators. During the apprehension, Kohlmaier punched Deputy Long in the face, causing his nose to bleed. Deputy Long eventually was able to secure Kohlmaier in handcuffs and detain him for responding deputies who were enroute to assist. Kohlmaier and Smith are on felony probation for six counts of burglary and are not supposed to have contact with one another as a condition of their probation. The juvenile was arrested on two misdemeanor counts.

OCALA, Fla. (March 24, 2017) – Consistent with employment trends going back at least five years, the February jobless rate dropped over the month in Citrus, Levy and Marion counties.

According to today's employment summary by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO), the unemployment rate for the CareerSource CLM region was 5.9 percent, down 0.7 percentage point since January and the same rate as one year ago.

Out of an expanded labor force of 200,814, there were 11,802 unemployed residents in the region, a drop of 1,396 over the month. While that's 247 more than in February 2016, there were 189,012 people with jobs throughout the three counties, an increase of 2,676 since January and 6,045 more than a year ago.

Additionally, the DEO reports that the Ocala metropolitan statistical area (MSA) continued to hold the fastest annual job growth rate compared to all metros in Florida in professional and business services, at 11.1 percent. The Ocala MSA had the second fastest job growth rate in trade, transportation and utilities at 5.8 percent.

Rusty Skinner, CareerSource CLM's CEO said that the region hit the trifecta when it comes to economic indicators, posting an expanded labor force fueled by strong job gains and an across-the-board drop in the

number of unemployed.

Levy County continued to post the lowest jobless rate in the region, at 5.0 percent, which down 0.7 percent; followed by Marion County at 5.7 percent, down from 6.4 percent; and Citrus County at 6.7 percent, down from 7.6 percent. Florida's not seasonally adjusted rate was 4.7 percent, down over the month from 5.2 percent; and the nation's rate was 4.9 percent, down from 5.1 percent.

Skinner said the February report is a good gauge of whether the optimism of job seekers resulted in their absorption into the ranks of the employed. "That more than appears to be the case," Skinner said, adding that in addition to job-seeker confidence, the previous month's increase in unemployment was likely also fueled by post-holiday season staff adjustments. "The true test as to whether the economy is improving is whether those who have entered the labor force looking for work

have been able to find it." Skinner noted that since at least 2012, February unemployment rates have dropped in all three counties.

The following is a breakdown of preliminary employment numbers for each county:

- Citrus County's labor force increased by 692 to 48,101, the number of employed rose by 1,017 to 44,874, and the number of those without jobs fell by 387 to 3,227 month. The number of unemployed was virtually unchanged from February 2016 when the rate was 7.2 percent, while the number of employed increased over the year by 367.

- Levy County's labor force expanded by 87 to 16,890, the number of employed increased by 208 to 16,048 and the number of unemployed dropped by 121 to 842. That's 325 more employed and only 8 more unemployed compared to a year ago when the jobless rate was 5.1 percent.

- Marion County's labor force grew by 501 to 135,823, the number of employed increased by 1,389 to 128,090 and the number of jobless decreased by 888 to 7,733. While that is 245 more unemployed since February 2016 when the jobless rate was 5.8 percent, the number of those with jobs has increase by 5,353 over the year.

Among the counties, Citrus County continued to hold the third highest rate behind Sumter County at 7.0 percent and Hendry County at 7.2 percent; Marion County remained at 10th highest; and Levy County dropped two spots to 28th.

The Villages MSA continued to post the highest rate among the states metros, Homosassa Springs (Citrus County) was second and Ocala fell from third to fourth.

Florida Businesses Created Nearly 54,000 Jobs in 2017
