OFR Responds

OFR Responds to Plane Crash at Ocala International Airport


Ocala Fire Rescue responded to a plane crash at the Ocala International Airport on Saturday, June 8, at 7:51 p.m. The initial dispatch included Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting (ARFF), Engine 4, Squad 7, Battalion Chief 11, and a Safety Officer, following a distress call from a pilot who reported his aircraft had crashed.

Upon arrival at 1770 SW 60th Ave., crews discovered an experimental aircraft with its tail elevated, nestled against a tree line just outside the airport's fence line. The pilot, who was the sole occupant of the aircraft, was alert but unable to exit the plane due to its precarious position and the surrounding trees.

Given the challenging offroad location, first responders utilized a smaller vehicle to reach and extricate the pilot. Once the pilot was assessed and stabilized by emergency personnel, he was carefully helped out of the wreckage and escorted to a waiting ambulance for transport to a medical facility.

Engine 6 and Rescue 6 were initially added to the response but were cancelled prior to arrival. Marion County Fire Rescue, Ocala International Airport Personnel, and the Ocala Police Department also responded.

The Federal Aviation Administration and the State Warning Point were notified.



From the Desk of Senator Dennis Baxley---

Good morning friends-

With the elections just around the corner, I wanted to share with you the constitutional amendments that will be on the ballot for the General Election on November 5th, 2024.

Amendment One – Partisan Election of Members of District School Board – HJR 31 passed by the Legislature 2024... This will require members of a district school board to be elected in a partisan election rather than a nonpartisan election and to specify that the amendment only applies to elections held on or after the November 2026 general election.

Amendment Two – Right to Fish and Hunt – CS/HJR 1157 passed by the Legislature 2024... Preserving the forever fishing and hunting, including by the use of traditional methods, as a public right and preferred means of responsibility managing and controlling fish and wildlife.

Amendment Three – Adult Personal Use of Marijuana – Allows adults 21 years or older to possess, purchase, or use marijuana products and marijuana accessories for non-medical personal consumption by smoking, ingestion, or otherwise; allows Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers, and other state licensed entities, to acquire, cultivate, process, manufacture, sell and distribute such products and accessories. Applies to Florida law; does not change, or immunize violations of, federal law. Establishes possession limits for personal use.

Amendment Four – Limit Government Interference with Abortion – No law shall prohibit, penalize, delay, or restrict abortion before viability or when necessary to protect the patient's health, as determined by the patient's healthcare provider. This amendment does not change the Legislature's Constitutional authority to require notification to a parent or guardian before a minor has an abortion.

Amendment Five – Annual Adjustments to the Value of Certain Homestead Exemptions – Requires an annual adjustment for inflation to the value of current or future homestead exemptions that apply solely to levies other than school district levies and for which every person who has legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains thereon the permanent resident of the owner, or another person legally or naturally dependent upon the owner is eligible. This amendment takes effect January 1, 2025.

Amendment Six – Repeal of Public Campaign Financing Requirement – Repeals the provision in the State Constitution which requires public financing for campaigns of candidates for elective statewide office who agree to campaign spending limits.

It's not too early with the primary coming up on August 20, 2024, to make sure your voting registration is in order and you know where your voting precinct is located.

Rainbow Springs State Park

Babe it's HOT outside! That means Rainbow Springs State Park is getting very, very busy. This news letter is going to be a reminder to everyone about the dos and don'ts of the park weather your new to our area or here year-round, it's always good to review. The weekends are extremely busy and as most have seen Hwy.41 north and south bound lanes are backed up. This creates a very dangerous situation. Therefore, you will notice a Sherriff Officer monitoring the park, the park entrances and exits on the weekends to ensure safety. To keep the traffic flowing, off of Hwy 41, you might be redirected out. So don't be surprised when we have reached capacity and the park is closed that you are informed of this. Plan you day early as there are many times we reach capacity within 1-2 hours and may not reopen. We do this for safety reasons. In our swim area the water is very deep so be prepared with either a life vest, which MUST be worn, you cannot use it to float on top of. Styrofoam noodles not plastic noodles are the only floatation allowed in the water. No tubes, rafts, Kayaks or paddles boards are allowed in the swim area. If you are on a vessel you can dock it at the boat ramp rental area and walk to the swim area to swim. No swimming is allowed outside of the swim area, no scuba

diving is allowed in the State Park aquatic area. Please remember we are an aquatic preserve. If you swim outside the area you are disturbing the underwater life and growth. Infants can be in the 2 holed tube float and handicapped individuals can use their approved handicapped device. The swim dock is small so we ask that no chairs, strollers, tables and personnel belongings are on the dock, no sun bathing as well as this becomes a trip hazard. Leave you radios up on the lawn area and not on the swim dock. Parents, please keep an eye on your children we do not have life guards and things can happen quickly. Lastly, do not hang on the rope lines, when you do this it wears away the coating on the ropes causing them to stretch, and then the ropes sink to the bottom. Do not climb on the big orange buoys. Boats that are powered by gas and trolling motors are not permitted in the River of the State Park. Trolling motors must be lifted and you must paddle into the aquatic area. Our Patrol Boat has an electric motor and that is how we are able to patrol the water. Rainbow Springs State Park welcomes you and we want you to have a great memorable time so please help us to keep you safe as well. We are looking for volunteers on our Boat Patrol, Wednesday crew, parking and gift shop. If you have just a few hours please contact Thea.M.Knott@FloridaDep.gov. Office:352-465-8518.



Private School Choice

One Million Students Now Using Private School Choice

(NAPSI)—Here's news many parents may be interested to learn: According to the most recent data available, 1,038,487 K-12 students are currently enrolled in an education savings account (ESA), voucher, tax-credit scholarship, tax-credit ESA, or refundable tax credit program. While some states provide data for the most recent school year, others lag behind, so actual participation is likely higher.

"When Milton and Rose Friedman founded EdChoice in 1996 to lead the way for universal education freedom, there were about 10,000 students participating in choice programs," said EdChoice President and CEO Robert Enlow. "Today, that number has grown a hundred-fold. Over 1 million students can learn in the environment of their family's choosing thanks to policies that empower parents with the freedom and

flexibility to be in the driver's seat of their child's education."

Trends in Education

Participation in these programs has grown steadily in recent decades, with rapid growth taking off around 2020, and roughly doubling since. At the same time, policymakers across the country have been increasing student access to private school choice programs at record pace. In 2021, West Virginia created the nation's first school choice program with universal eligibility, and the following year, Arizona made its ESA program available to all students. Today, 12 states offer educational choice programs for all or nearly all students. Nationwide, there are 75 school choice programs spread across 33 states, plus Washington, D.C. and Puerto Rico.

In all, nearly 22 million students, or 40%, now have access to a private school choice program. With so many families gaining

eligibility to programs in only the last few years, participation is expected to rise. This school choice momentum, which was building for years and years, exploded after the COVID-19 pandemic. Parents took what was solid growth and supercharged the movement for educational freedom. Prior to the pandemic, many state choice programs, although broad, were limited in who could apply.

"We know from survey data that parents aren't getting what they want in their child's learning environment," Enlow said. "More than 60% say, if given the opportunity to choose something other than their local public school, they would. Yet, only about 20% are doing so. As states increase access to school choice programs, we know the gap in parent preferences and actual enrollment will continue to close, and students will be happier and more successful because of it."

Storm Power Outage

1. Before a storm identify which equipment could be needed. Chainsaws or pole saws can trim and clear limbs and shrubs that may break off or get damaged by high winds. String trimmers, pruners and chainsaws can remove other material from around your home that may make it vulnerable to wildfires.

A portable generator powers key appliances and charges cell phones when utilities go down. A whole house generator can keep the lights and appliances on and running. Before an outage, plan where the generator will be set up (never in a home or garage, and always away from your home and any air intake) and determine how to secure it if needed. Buy and install a carbon monoxide detector. Get outdoor-rated extension cords for portable generators and consider adding an approved generator cover

for rainy weather.

Water pumps can get water and muck out of basements and homes. Be sure you know how to operate the pump. Never pump substances that your equipment is not designed to cope with. Pay attention to avoid overheating and follow all safety precautions.

A utility type vehicle can transport people and supplies quickly in an emergency. Keep the vehicle stable and drive slowly. Do not turn mid-slope or while on a hill. Consider taking a UTV safety course.

2. Always read and follow the safety and usage recommendations provided by outdoor power equipment manufacturers. Never disable safety features. Practice how to operate equipment before you need it. Follow all recommended safety measures on the product as well as in the owner's manual.

3. Have the right fuel on hand and charge batteries ahead of bad weather. Most gasoline-powered equipment uses E10 or less fuel and most manufacturers recommend adding a fuel stabilizer. Fuel that is more than 30 days old may phase separate and cause running problems, so it's important to purchase fuel just ahead of a storm. Store fuel safely and only use an approved fuel container. Only use manufacturer-recommended batteries.

4. Pay attention to your energy level and health. Preparation for bad weather, a power outage and storm cleanup can be taxing. Do not operate power equipment when tired or overly fatigued. Drink plenty of water and take regular breaks. Always use safety gear such as chaps, gloves, eye protection and hearing protection when operating equipment.

5. Always keep children and pets away from operating outdoor power equipment. Outdoor power equipment are not toys, and should never be used in a manner not intended by the manufacturer.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla.—Attorney General Ashley Moody's Office of Statewide Prosecution today announced the arrest of six fraudsters for stealing nearly \$250,000 from Florida seniors through grandparent scams. The Miami-Dade Police Department's Vice Intelligence Squad reports that the defendants contacted seniors posing as lawyers or legal representatives of one of the victim's grandchildren. The fraudsters told the targets that the grandchildren were arrested after hitting a pregnant woman with a vehicle and needed bail money, then arranged for the victim to send payment.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "These fraudsters know that most grandparents would do anything to help a grandchild in need, and through a convincing imposter scheme they used fear

DeSantis Commits Increases to Teacher Pay

HIALEAH, Fla.—Today, Governor Ron DeSantis announced his commitment to approving a historic teacher salary funding increase of \$1.25 billion in the budget for Fiscal Year 2024–25. "Florida's education system is number one in the nation, and we want to make sure good educators are attracted to Florida with attractive compensation," said Governor Ron DeSantis. "I am proud to have invested more than \$4 billion for teacher pay increases since the beginning of my time in office, and I will continue to push for increased funding for Florida's teachers."

"I want to thank Governor DeSantis for his steadfast commitment and unwavering dedication to Florida's education system throughout the years," said Florida Department of Education Commissioner Manny Diaz, Jr. "Florida continues to attract some of the best educators in the country and it is a testament to the work that Governor DeSantis has done to support education and raise teacher pay. Florida is the education state and with investments like this, we will continue to lead the nation for years to come."

For the 2023–2024 school year, Florida's average starting teacher pay is over \$48,000, and the average teacher salary exceeds

\$54,000. Before Governor DeSantis took office, there was no dedicated, recurring funding for teacher pay increases. In 2020, the Teacher Salary Increase Allocation was established in the budget and has risen from \$500,000,000 to more than \$1.25 billion approved today for the upcoming year. DeSantis Highlights Coral Reef

MARATHON, Fla.—Today, Governor Ron DeSantis highlighted Florida's investments in coral reef protection and announced enhancements to the 2024 Lionfish Challenge and 2024 Lobster Mini-Season. Through the FY 2024-2025 Focus on Florida's Future Budget, the Governor invested a historic \$57 million for coral reef restoration and coastal protection, bringing the total investment in these efforts in the Governor's second term to over \$114 million.

The Governor also highlighted \$5 million in funding to create additional artificial reef habitats through the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC). This funding will support the establishment of an innovative framework for installing, overseeing, and preserving artificial reef habitats in the Florida Keys.

And earlier this year, Governor DeSantis allocated \$9.5 million to Florida's Coral Reef Restoration and Recovery Initiative.

and family to extort Florida seniors—stealing nearly a quarter of a million dollars. Working with our great law enforcement partners in South Florida, we were able to shut down this far-reaching grandparent scheme and now six fraudsters will have to answer for their crimes.”

Miami-Dade Police Department Director

Stephanie V. Daniels said, “I am immensely proud of the Miami-Dade Police Department's Vice Intelligence Squad, for their exceptional collaboration with the Florida Attorney General, and federal agencies in successfully apprehending individuals involved in extorting the elderly population. Their dedication, expertise, and unwavering commitment to protecting our community's most vulnerable population are truly commendable.”

After telling the targets the falsified story about the grandchildren in jail, the fraudsters pressured seniors to provide bail money. According to the investigation, the defendants directed the victims to obtain the bail amount in cash, then place it into a box to be picked up by a courier. The couriers—unknowing ride-share drivers booked by the criminals—picked up the cash and transported the money back to the scammers at an arranged rendezvous spot.

Rep. Cammack Applauds Wins For Florida Producers In 2024 Farm Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Early this morning, the House Agriculture Committee completed its full committee markup of

the 2024 Farm Bill, the Farm, Food, and National Security Act of 2024. Congresswoman Cammack voted to pass the bill, joining her colleagues for a final bipartisan vote of 33 to 21.

Congresswoman Cammack spoke during the opening remarks for Members during the markup, lauding the bill's provisions that will support Florida's farmers, ranchers, and producers. View her full comments here.

Included in the bill are several wins for Florida's specialty crop producers, including the establishment of a specialty crop committee, funding for the Specialty Crop Research Initiative, more funding for specialty crop mechanization and automation research. Additionally, the bill ensures AGI (adjusted gross income)

waivers for disasters and eliminates the AGI limitation for farmers who make more than 75 percent of their income from agriculture.

The Farm, Food, and National Security Act also includes the standing block grant authority for specialty crops, which stems from one of Congresswoman Cammack's leading legislative initiatives before the House Agriculture Committee.

While citrus producers continue to struggle with citrus greening, Rep. Cammack helped reauthorize the Emergency Citrus Disease Research and Extension Program.

For agricultural labor, Rep. Cammack secured a groundbreaking program for precision agriculture and improves precision agriculture practices and their accessibility for producers.

The Livestock Indemnity Program is updated within this bill to increase the payment rate to 100 percent of the fair market value of the animal. Rep. Cammack's effort to secure this provision will help Florida's ranchers continue their way of life in the 21st century.

Florida's rich timber industry will be able to maintain its health with the Forest

Service's authority to expand existing programs to address wildfire.

Finally, Florida's commodities received a critical voluntary base acre update and a commodity price raise.

Rep. Cammack praised the work of the Committee, saying:

"The Farm, Food, and National Security Act of 2024 is the culmination of a lot of hard work and listening to producers from around the country. The crafting of this bill has been no easy endeavor, and we still have a long way to go in getting this across the finish line. However, to secure so many critical wins in this base text for Florida farmers, ranchers, and producers is a big relief. Knowing the tremendous pressures our agriculture community has been under in the Sunshine State, it was said all along that Florida had both the most to lose and the most to gain in this bill and I am so glad that we came out on the favorable side of that equation.

"Florida will remain a strong and competitive production agriculture state because of this work and I am so thankful for the many people and organizations that helped along the way. I am especially proud of my team and my local producers who took so much time over the years to help craft this thoughtful and impactful policy. We are looking forward to the next steps of bringing this bill to the House Floor for a full vote and ultimately, to the President's desk."

Rep. Cammack Joins Colleagues In Bipartisan Resolution To Memorialize Officers Lost In Line Of Duty

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Today, Rep. Cammack joined a bipartisan delegation of members to introduce a resolution which seeks to honor and

memorialize law enforcement whose lives were lost in the line of duty.

H. Res. 1226 expresses unwavering support for law enforcement across the nation and recognizes the importance that police officers have all the equipment and resources necessary to keep our communities safe in order to protect them while they tirelessly protect us.


