Flags at Half Staff

Flags at Half-Staff in Honor of Military Troops Killed in Tennessee Shooting

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - July 20, 2015-Governor Rick Scott directed the flags of the United States and the State of Florida to be flown at half-staff in honor of the five service members who were murdered at recruiting centers in Chattanooga, Tennessee last week. This is effective immediately throughout the state of Florida until sunset on the day of the final military member's date of interment.

On Saturday, Governor Scott issued an executive order directing Florida Adjutant General Michael Calhoun to take three im-

Here in Florida, Gov. Rick Scott is making protecting the military a top priority. The governor ordered the temporary relocation of National Guard members from six "storefront" recruitment centers to armories through an executive order issued over the weekend.

The executive order will put firearms in the hands of the military. As stated in the order, Florida will provide for the "provision of arms" for full-time Florida Guardsmen who don't have their own weapon issued to them. Additionally, the state will also expedite the application process for members needing new concealed weapons permits.

What has happened has again demonstrated the danger of gun-free zones. They create a sterile target for those that would do violence. It is the hope that this move will allow soldiers to be armed and prepared to stop violence rather than be the victims of violence. BP Settlement Will Help Florida Invest in Key Projects

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Governor Rick Scott released the below statement following the announcement from BP on settling with the United States and Gulf coast states impacted by the 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill. As part of the agreement in principle, Florida will receive at least \$3.25 billion. This includes \$2 billion for economic damages, \$680 million for natural resource damages and \$572 from the RESTORE ACT (subject to approval from the RESTORE Council). In addition, it is estimated that the Florida entities designated in the RESTORE

ACT will receive an additional \$250 million. Also, up to \$1 billion will be available to resolve economic claims of the vast majority of local governmental entities located in Florida, Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama.

Governor Rick Scott said, "This agreement will help Florida implement key projects and invest in environmental priorities to keep our state beautiful. I want to thank Attorney General Pam Bondi, Florida Fish and Wildlife

Conservation Commission Executive Director Nick Wiley and Department of Environmental Protection Secretary Jon Steverson for their hard work on this agreement with BP."

News for Older Americans

Aging In Place Made Safer & Easier (NAPSI)—A recent Harris Poll released by HomeServe USA found some surprising facts about Americans 50 and over.

Not Going Anywhere

For one thing, many have no intention of leaving their homes until well into retirement, if at all. Forty-one percent plan to stay where they live now until age 81 or older.

Feeling Safe At Home

The majority are confident about growing old in their homes, too. Only 37 percent expect they'll need to make modifications so their homes are safer and easily accessible as they age.

Handling Emergencies

The survey found that two in five have experienced a home emergency in the past 12 months. A faulty heating or air-conditioning system was the No. 1 most common home emergency, with 14 percent needing to repair or replace one of these systems over the last year. The second most common was a blocked or overflowing toilet (10 percent), followed by a faulty electrical circuit, switch or outlet, and a water heater repair or replacement (each 7 percent).

Many Are Unprepared

Many Americans 50-plus are not prepared to cover the expenses of unexpected home emergencies. Close to a third report they have not set aside money to cover an emergency home repair, while 17 percent have \$1,000 or less put away for emergency home repairs.

Despite this, saving for unexpected expenses ranks a close third among 50-plus Americans' top financial concerns, with 26 percent reporting it as the one that worries them the most. The No. 1 financial concern is identity theft (30 percent), followed by running out of money in retirement (27 percent).

With identity theft top of mind for Americans 50-plus, letting a stranger in the house to do repairs may be a source of anxiety.

Saving Water

Drought Or Not, Every Drop Counts

(NAPSI)—As summer and warm-weather activities heat up, it may be tempting to leave the water running to keep yourself and your lawn cool. However, as seen on the West Coast, droughts rob communities of the rain or snow that replenishes their much-needed water supplies, so saving water for the future becomes more important than ever.


Drought may not be an issue in your region right now, but water shortages strike different areas at different times of the year, so saving water is always in season! Wherever you live, make it a water-savvy summer with the following tips:

- Take a sprinkler break. Grass doesn't have to be bright green year-round. It's natural for it to turn a little brown at the tips during summer's hottest months. You can cut back on watering and maintain a healthy lawn, so skip that shower for your land-scape. For every 20-minute watering session missed, you could save 2,500 gallons of water or more!
- Consider an upgrade. If you're thinking about a bathroom update, now is a good time to replace old plumbing fixtures with watersaving models. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's WaterSense® program labels toilets, faucets and showerheads that have been independently certified to perform well and use less water and energy than the standard ones.
- Follow the rules. When in drought, your community may need to enforce temporary water restrictions to save limited supplies for those who need it most, including firefighters, hospitals and utilities. Respect requests to use less water on your lawns, cars and other outdoor uses during water shortages.
- Go the extra mile. If you want to go above and beyond, you can collect water in a bucket while waiting for the shower to warm up or when washing pots, and use it to water container plants or flower beds. Use your imagination to come up with creative ways to save water or visit www.epa.gov/watersense/our_water/drought.html.

In the future, consider landscaping with plants that are suited to your area's climate and use less water. Learn more at www.epa. gov/watersense/outdoor/landscaping_tips. html. It was July of 2014, and I had arrived early to the airport in Istanbul to make absolute CERTAIN, that I would not miss my flight. In fact I staved up all night in the Starbucks café as to make sure I wouldn't miss my gate opening. Side note, if you ever make a bet that there is a Starbucks in every airport

Part 6: Arriving American, Departing no matter the country, you will normally be the winner of that gamble. Also, Istanbul is a great city to buy gifts for your family and friends in. Of course the more touristy areas will have higher prices but overall it was my experience that any local individual that owned his own business was willing to negotiate, especially if you buy multiple things

I made it to my plane, "Sleepless In Se-

attle" no, not Seattle... but sleepless none the less. Again I flew with Turkish Airlines and what an absolute stellar service! Full on board meal, chicken in sauce, bread, vegetables, and a piece of Turkish Delight candy. It was the type of service you imagine that used to exist commonly in the past but has become now like a White Rhino... nearly extinct.

I arrived in Ireland and spent the next three days traversing the whole country by car with my family. We literally drove across the whole country. Our mistake was that we tried to see too many places with too much distance between them, in a short period of time. Other than that the countryside was beautiful. Yes the rumors are true: green, very green. But as native Floridians my family said on more than one occasion that they could never live there because it was too "gloomy", not enough direct sunlight. But, this certainly made all the flowers and plants extra happy. In Florida it seems life half the year most of the grass is just burnt up from direct exposure. It also took some terror induced time to acclimate to the fact that we were driving on the "wrong" side of the road. Sheer terror I tell you to come around a country road that already felt too tight, and too fast, to see a car coming at you in the direction everything inside of you says, "Oh no that is the wrong side- Red Alert!" So that made for some humorous videos of my mother and I having multiple mini panic attacks.

After our three days in Ireland it was time to separate from my family, taking with her

the plane ticket my mother had so graciously bought me, back to the U.S. I instead hopped on a plane alone to Santiago de Compostela, Spain. There I would meet the host who I would be living with for a total of 6 weeks for the first time. The arrangement was that I would do about 4 hours of work per day in exchange for food and lodging in her home. My work was to tutor her in English as she had a big exam in September. For me it was a great opportunity to strengthen my Spanish, immerse myself in a new culture, and travel alone- which was something that really scared me. Largely this is why I had to

I never saw a picture of her and was very nervous upon arriving in the airport. Everyone was only speaking Spanish around me. Then I saw a sign with my name on it. "Maria?" She greeted me warmly and with a hug, as a complete stranger. In this moment my fears were laid to rest and I knew that this was where I was supposed to be. We went to her apartment in the coastal city of A Coruña, Spain (pronounced Ah- Kar-oohnya). In the morning we woke up and the first thing we did was go sight-seeing. She took me to a light house that was built in the 2nd century and nearly 2,000 years old, built by the Romans, that was still in use to this day. There is nothing like this in the U.S. and it was amazing to walk in and touch something so old, so precise, and so ageless

Maria's English was not so bad, but not so good. However, her kindness and patient spirit was transcendent of language. She was

a wonderful host. For the first week or so I was anxious as I felt we didn't do enough studying. But what Maria was wanting most was conversational practice. Maria herself had the equivalent of a Master's Degree in Education and had certification as a pedagogue. Pedagogy is much more common in Europe than in the U.S. I myself had never heard of it previously. Essentially it takes a more holistic approach to the learning process of children. So think of it as if teacher dispenses information, pedagogues dispense life skills. Maria needed to pass her English language exam so that she would be better qualified for work in English speaking countries, such as Ireland or England.

Spain has a very high unemployment rate, one which rivals Greece yet we don't

hear about it as often. There is a mass exodus right now of qualified individuals leaving the country to pursue higher paying professional level jobs. Her sister, for example, had recently graduated with her PhD. in biology and was set to begin a contract with a university in Oklahoma at the start of the fall semester in August. Having me around was to help Maria improve her English pronunciation and conversation skills. And once she was able to pass her exam she would be one step closer to qualifying for better paying work.

Ireland seemed to be like Valhalla to the Spaniards and America akin to the Promised Land; the pinnacles of hope for career and life satisfaction. I met many people, both adults and youth alike who were traveling to Ireland for camps to train them in English.

Especially since English television and cinema dominate the market there, "Game of Thrones" and "Breaking Bad" was a universal topic I could bring up

with a stranger that could bridge nearly any language barrier.

Jobless Rate Drops

Area bucks 'summer slump' trend, posts drop in jobless rate

OCALA, Fla. (July 17, 2015) – For the first time, stretching back to at least 2008, the CareerSource Citrus Levy Marion area has bucked the seasonal summer trend – when unemployment typically begins to spike before peaking in July – and posted a drop in the June unemployment rate.

CareerSource Citrus Levy Marion's jobless rate in June was 6.7 percent, down 0.2 percentage point over the month and a drop of 0.9 percent over the year. Out of labor force of 194,446 there were 13,069 unemployed, a decrease of 548 since May and 1,961 fewer than the same time last year.

According to the June employment summary released by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO), Levy County continued to hold the lowest rate in the three-county area at 6.1 percent, followed again by Marion County with 6.5 percent and Citrus County at 7.6 percent. The comparative, not-seasonally adjusted jobless rate for both Florida and the nation is 5.5 percent.

DEO reports that unemployment rates decreased over the month in 44 of Florida's counties, remained unchanged in nine and rose in 14. That is the first break in the seasonal summer slump typically experienced at this time of year caused by drops in public education and agriculture employment.

By way of comparison, in last year's report for June, only four counties posted drops

in unemployment rates, seven remained unchanged and rates rose in 56 counties, including Citrus, Levy and Marion.

All 25 metro areas experienced job gains since June 2014. The Ocala Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) added 3,400 nonfarm jobs over the year for a 3.6 percent growth rate, which was the fifth highest rate in the state.

At the same time, however, normal seasonality has impacted the area, which saw across-the-board drops in the number of employed and contraction of the labor force.

Kathleen Woodring, chief operating officer of CareerSource Citrus Levy Marion, said those drops may reflect a number of factors, including education support personnel taking vacations in June and not looking for summer employment during the month.

"Yes, the numbers of unemployed are down, but the drop in the rate is likely caused by the shrinkage in the labor force," she said. "But this isn't cause for panic. If you aren't working, and you're not looking for work, you aren't in the labor force, and those taking summer vacations or sabbaticals aren't in the labor force."

Woodring added that strong over-theyear job growth in the Ocala MSA particularly, and a boost in employment heading into June when 900 jobs were added, helped keep the summer slump at bay.

"We gained 900 jobs in May in the Ocala metro and lost 1,100 in June. That's not a surprise," Woodring said. "The good news

is, we know jobs are out there and that employers are hiring. We held a dozen hiring events in June and so far in July we've had 15 hiring events and more are scheduled."

Here's a breakdown for each county in the region:

- Citrus County's labor force decreased by 849 to 47,085, the number of employed fell by 676 to 43,505 and the number of those without jobs dropped by 173 to 3,580. The unemployment rate in June 2014 was 8.5 percent when there were 4,171 unemployed.
- Levy County's labor force fell by 156 to 15,975, the number of employed dropped by 151 to 14,995 and the number of unemployed decreased by 25 to 980. Over the year, the number of jobless has fallen by 169 when the unemployment rate was 7.0 percent.
- Marion County's labor force fell by 1,540 to 131,386, the number of employed decreased by 1,190 to 122,877, and those without jobs dropped by 350 to 8,509. Compared to the same time last year, there are 1,201 fewer unemployed than when the unemployment rate was 7.3 percent.

The Homosassa MSA continued to hold the highest unemployment rate among the state's metros, The Villages ranked fourth at 7.0 percent, and Ocala was fifth. The Homosassa metro area had 32,000 nonfarm jobs, unchanged over the year.

Total nonfarm employment for the Ocala MSA in June was 97,300 up from 93,900 jobs in 2014.

Six major industries gained jobs over

the year in the Ocala MSA, including trade, transportation and utilities, and leisure and hospitality (+800 jobs each); education and health services (+700 jobs); government (+600 jobs); and professional and business services, and manufacturing (+300 jobs each).

Growth in leisure and hospitality (+7.2 percent), government (+4.7 percent) and manufacturing (+4.1 percent) grew faster in the area than statewide. The Ocala MSA had the highest growth of all Florida metros in government, and the fifth highest growth rate in manufacturing.

The industry losing jobs was information (-100 jobs). Mining, logging and construction; financial activities; and other services remained unchanged over the year.

The employment report for July will be released on Friday, Aug. 21.
