As part of the CEP's mission to be the catalyst for a prosperous community, the organization partners closely with local governments (as well as state and Federal) to ensure that we are creating and maintaining a business climate which

encourages growth and prosperity. A recent example of this can be found in the issue of transportation impact fees.

In December, the Marion County Board of County Commissioners held a public

hearing on transportation impact fees. Among those who expressed their support in keeping these fees at their current rate was the Impact Fee Task Force coordinated by the Ocala/Marion County Chamber & Economic Partnership (CEP). The Task Force is composed of a broad range of professionals who are working on issues related to building and development every day. This group partnered with the County to study the impact fees when first proposed in 2015 and looked at the issue again last fall. At the conclusion of this hearing, the Commission made the unanimous decision to keep these fees at their current level.

Some have suggested that the County

needs to raise these fees to the highest possible levels (though no one at the hearing spoke in favor of raising the fees). This approach will not only *not* generate the funds needed to move our community forward but will hamper growth and development. I would like to share some of the findings from the Task Force which illustrate why the recommended and adopted approach is best:

- Construction financing is still a challenge with a significant number of projects (both commercial and residential) struggling to appraise;
- The cost of building supplies and labor has risen significantly over the last four years;
- The County's recently funded *Home Matters* report clearly outlines the challenges of constructing affordable housing and an increase in these fees


would only further add to this challenge;

• Construction costs have risen significantly in the last year. For example, lumber costs alone have increased 50% from January to November of this year.

The issue is not about profit but about the ability to finance a project. When it costs more to build than the construction appraisal, then a project does not get built. How would adding tens of thousands of dollars in costs which do not add to the value of the project increase the ability of the project appraising? It doesn't.

Some will want to argue the fallacy that through impact fees growth funds growth. History has demonstrated that this is just not the case. In less than two years, the sales tax funds dedicated to transportation will far exceed the impact fees which would have been collected over seven years. The sales tax ensures that 1) everyone including visitors and out-of-county commuters are helping to fund the infrastructure they use; 2) a significant, reliable source of income is available; and 3) that new construction and maintenance needs (on which impact fees are legally prohibited) can be addressed.

The CEP and our business partners greatly value our strong partnership with our local governments and look forward to continuing to work together to keep our community *Moving Forward*.



THIS FLU SEASON

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH IN MARION COUNTY REMINDS YOU TO TAKE PRECAUTIONS THIS FLU SEASON

OCALA, Fla.-In Florida and throughout the U.S., flu activity is on the rise. Marion County is currently seeing moderate flu activity that is actively increasing. From Dec. 31, 2017, to Jan. 13, 2018, county hospitals and emergency rooms reported 265 confirmed cases of influenza, an average of 19 cases per day. In December, approximately 8 were confirmed each day.

"It's important to see your health care provider if you become sick with flu-like symptoms," said Florida Department of Health in Marion County Health Officer Mark Lander. "The flu can have serious consequences even for someone who has been very healthy previously."

Health care providers can prescribe antiviral treatment if appropriate. Treatment is most effective when started within 48 hours, so calling as soon as you become ill is important, especially if you or your loved one is at a higher risk for complications. Children younger than 5, adults over the age of 65, pregnant women, and those with underlying medical conditions are considered most at-risk.

Residents are encouraged to get their flu vaccine now if they haven't gotten one already. There are still weeks of flu activity to come (and plenty of opportunities to become ill). Flu vaccines can vary in

effectiveness from season to season, but they continue to be the best way to prevent influenza infection and serious influenza complications.

The flu vaccine is safe, and it's recommended for everyone six months and older, including pregnant women. Contact your doctor's office or local pharmacy today to check on flu shot availability. Children and uninsured or under-insured residents can get one for free or a low cost at the Department of Health in Marion County's main office in Ocala (1801 SE 32nd Ave.) Monday through Friday. To schedule your flu shot at the Department of Health, please call 352-644-2695 or 352-644-2770. The department also takes walk-in appointments.

It's important to stay home from work and keep children home from school or daycare when sick to help prevent spreading the flu to others. The department recommends that sick people stay home or keep sick children home until fever-free for at least 24 hours (without the use of fever-reducing medication).

It is also essential to practice good hygiene by properly and frequently washing your

MISSING CAVE TEACHER **DIVER**

MCSO CONCLUDES SEARCH FOR MISSING CAVE DIVER

MARION COUNTY, Florida (January 2, 2018) - The Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) has officially concluded their fourday search for a cave diver at the Silver Glen Springs Recreation Area, located at 5271 North Highway 19 in Salt Springs. On December 27, 2017, deputies were called out to the recreation area in reference to a missing diver. Witnesses at the park saw a male diver enter the water and when the parked closed, his car and personal belongings were still there.

During the investigation, MCSO Major Crimes detectives determined the missing diver to be Alexander James McKeeman (DOB: 11/13/1992) from Orlando, Florida.

MCSO conducted an extensive search for McKeeman, spanning over four days. MCSO's Underwater Recovery Team and several teams of professional divers dove the caves in an effort to locate McKeeman, but he was not found. MCSO's Field Force and Aviation Units have also searched the area multiple times, but their searches have yielded negative results.

At this point, all of the evidence found at the scene leads detectives to believe that McKeeman entered the springs and did not come out. However, if you have any information regarding McKeeman's whereabouts, or if you have information on what happened at Silver Glen Springs on the day of his disappearance, please call Detective John Lightle at 352-369-6715.

ARRESTED

LAKE WEIR HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER ARRESTED FOR SEXUAL ASSAULT ON FORMER FEMALE STUDENT

MARION COUNTY, Florida (January 17, 2018) – On Tuesday, January 16, 2018, Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) Major Crimes detectives arrested Lake Weir High School (LWHS) teacher Jason Michael Tarlton (DOB: 01/20/1987) for sexually assaulting a 17-year old female student who he used to teach. The offense was discovered after inappropriate pictures of Tarlton and the victim were uploaded to a social media application and were brought to the attention of the MCSO School Resource Officer assigned to LWHS.

On Tuesday, MCSO School Resource Officer Erik Deangelis was made aware of several inappropriate images uploaded to the "Afterschool" phone application depicting Tarlton and the victim in a sexual manner. One of the pictures showed Tarlton and the victim standing in front of a mirror in a hotel bathroom partially clothed. The other picture was of Tarlton completely nude.

Detectives made contact with the victim. who said she accidentally uploaded the pictures from her phone to the application. The victim advised that she is no longer a student at LWHS, but had Tarlton as a teacher last year. She told detectives that they became friends and eventually became sexually involved. She said that Tarlton told her that he loved her and if he ever got caught, he said she was "worth it." Detectives then responded to Tarlton's residence and placed him under arrest. Upon

a printed copy of the Florida statutes for Chapter 948.30, in plain view on the passenger seat of his vehicle. This statute discusses probation and community control involving sex offenses. The paperwork was freshly printed on January 16, 2018 at 3:19 p.m., hours before his arrest.

Tarlton was charged with one count of Sexual Assault by a Custodian- Victim between the ages of 12-18 years old. He has since posted his \$10,000 bond and was released from the Marion County Jail.

- Choose your beverages wisely. Avoid or limit fruit juices, sodas, alcohol and high-sugar sports drinks.
- Drink a glass of water during and between meals, as well as before, during and after exercise.
- Plan outdoor activities for cooler parts of the day.



Tampa Area Ranks Third in State Job Creation

TAMPA, Fla. — Today, Governor Rick Scott announced that the Tampa area added 28,000 new private-sector jobs in the last year, creating the third-highest number of jobs among all Florida metro areas. Tampa's unemployment rate dropped to 3.4 percent, down 1.1 percentage points from one year ago. Statewide, Florida businesses created nearly 30,000 new jobs in December bringing the total number of new privatesector jobs created in Florida to 1,497,100 since December 2010.

Governor Scott said, "Last year ended strong with 28,000 new jobs created in the Tampa Bay area. Statewide, nearly 1.5 million jobs have been created since December 2010, and it is clear that we are on track to making Florida the best place in the nation for families to find new opportunities."

The industries with the highest growth over the year in Tampa were professional and business services with 7,000 new jobs and education and health services with 6.100 new jobs.

The Tampa area remained first among the state metro areas in job demand in December with 40,143 openings. The Tampa area also continues to rank first in the state in demand for high-skill, high-wage STEM occupations with 13,179 openings in December.

As of December, Florida's unemployment

rate is at 3.7 percent, a drop of 7.0 percentage points since December 2010, faster than the national decline of 5.2 percentage points. In the last year, 185,000 people entered Florida's labor force, a growth of 1.9 percent, which is nearly four times the national labor force growth rate of only 0.5

In December, 18,828 Floridians were placed in jobs by CareerSource Tampa Bay and the state's other 23 local workforce

Protecting Your Privacy

(NAPSI)—Some people are taking an unhealthy interest in your medical information—but they can be stopped.

The Problem

With data breaches occurring across many industries, even sensitive data pertaining to patient health care records is at risk. A recent University of Phoenix study of 504 registered nurses and administrative staff found that only a quarter of registered nurses have seen changes in the way their companies handle data security and patient privacy over the past year despite increased data breaches across all industries. The survey also found that 20 percent of registered nurses and 19 percent of administrative staff admitted their facilities have experienced a breach of private patient

Furthermore, the Identity Theft Resource Center notes that, as of November 2017, there had been nearly 5 million data breaches in the health care industry. These breaches can be detrimental to organizations: According to IBM's 2017 Cost of Data Breach Study, health care is the most costly industry for data breaches, with the average cost per affected record at \$380.

The issue is further compounded by a lack of trained cybersecurity professionals to combat hackers, especially in health care, where professionals make less and are responsible for not only protecting systems, but lives. Without trained experts, the onus falls on RNs and administrators, who may be unaware of how to identify or prevent

Expert Advice

"Patient safety transcends physical, emotional and electronic bounds and, in our increasingly digital world, it is important for health care professionals to be prepared for the possibility of data breaches," said Doris Savron, executive dean for the College of Health Professions, College of Education and College of Humanities & Sciences at University of Phoenix. "Everyone in the health care industry must work together to establish protocols and implement training prepare health care professionals to provide to secure and protect all patient data to reduce the risk of being compromised."

Nurses and administrative staff agree, with 23 percent of RNs and 34 percent of administrative staff stating that additional support and training is needed for health care privacy and security.

"Health care organizations are extremely

susceptible to human error. If one employee accidentally invites malicious malware into a system, the impact can be catastrophic. To limit the amount of breaches, cybersecurity governance must improve," said Dennis Bonilla, executive dean for the College of Information Systems and Technology at University of Phoenix. "Without improved training and robust cybersecurity response plans incorporated into information technology strategies, the health care industry will continue to bear the brunt of these attacks.'

What's Being Done


Current steps being taken to ensure the protection of patient data include:

Updated privacy and access policies, according to more than two-thirds of RNs and administrative staff;

Role-based access, according to 59 percent of RNs and 60 percent of administrative staff; and

Data surveillance, according to most RNs and administrative staff.

"Understanding what we do well now to protect patient data can help us create an increasingly sophisticated framework to safeguard this sensitive information," added Savron. In addition, several hundred thousand more flooded cars may emerge from Hurricanes Harvey and Irma.


